QUESTIONS FREQUENTLY ASKED OF MAYOR NICHOLAS B. BLASE ~

What is the future of our community?

As we enter the 21st Century, I believe our community is in excellent physical shape regarding any possible future needs or requirements of our residents.

A bond issue, which we will be passing shortly for our infrastructure, will ensure that all of our streets, sewers, and watermains are in excellent condition as we move into the year 2000.

Niles is still a community that is much sought after by new residents and is a desirable location for businesses and industry.

What are the major problems facing Niles in the future?

It is important for our community to maintain a balance between younger families moving in and our senior population. The importance of this balance is necessary in order to preserve our school systems and the desirability of our community for future families.

Of course, we want all of our residents to age with us gracefully over a long extended life in the community of Niles; but, we must always keep in mind the fact that young families are important in order to ensure the viable health of any community.

As long as we have families interested in moving into our community, I believe that with the fixed assets which we have, the balance between industry and business, and our proximate location to the City of Chicago, will, in itself, assure us of continuing growth and prosperity.

I do not foresee any major problems of an ongoing nature. We will always have problems that will need to be addressed. For instance, property taxes are always a headache to all of our residents in the Village. As always, we will continue to try to keep the Niles portion of the property taxes at its lowest level.

There are problems from time-to-time that are imposed upon us by the State of Illinois and Federal Government which we have, in the past, been able to handle properly. In general, I do not foresee any major problem as we move into the year 2000 that will not be manageable.

Will the Park and the Village ever be one governmental body?

The Niles Park District and the Village of Niles have an excellent working relationship at the present time which I believe will continue. It is most important to remember that, because of strange laws in the State of Illinois, we have multiple separate governments such as a separate park district, library district, and school districts. This separation, at times, creates a problem; but, generally, these different governmental bodies are run well and account for much of the progress that we have seen in communities like ours.

How did we finance the new buildings in Niles, such as the new Senior Building, the new Fitness Center, and the upcoming new Public Services/Maintenance Building?

The Village of Niles financed all of these buildings through a process that did not necessitate the raising of any property taxes. The process is called a "TIF District". A TIF District allows us to use all present property taxes collected in an area for the payment of the structures that I previously mentioned. Generally, all of these buildings were built in an area that previously was depressed. Our Village Hall, Senior Center, and Fitness

Center, were built in a shopping center that had greatly depreciated in value, but gained new resurgence with the presence of Home Depot and Dominick's. Because of this resurgence, and the taxes paid by these two large corporations, we were able to construct these buildings.

How much time do you spend as Mayor and what do you do for a living?

Generally, I spend approximately 20 hours a week as part of my Mayoral duties which are divided between time spent at the Village Hall and also time spent at my own law office at 8074 North Milwaukee Avenue, Niles, IL. My salary, as Mayor, is \$4,000 per year.

My occupation is that of an attorney specializing in areas of auto accident injury, medical malpractice, and Workmen's Compensation claims. Since my law office is on Milwaukee Avenue, I have been able to devote as much time as necessary to Mayoral business than I would otherwise have been able to do if I had my law office in downtown Chicago.

The Public Works Water Section is always busy maintaining the water system, and making improvements and repairs when needed. Shown here (left to right) are Dennis O'Donovan, Rich Goszczynski and Tom Polcyn installing a water valve basin. Last year, crews repaired 125 water leaks and upgraded 37 fire hydrants along with other projects, such as water valve exercising and installation and other seasonal duties, like snow plowing, branch removal and leaf pick-up.

Using one of the Public Services Department's two Sewer Vactors, employees Chuck Nickerson, left, and Jack Grana help keep the sewer lines clean. In 1998, crews cleaned 179,182 feet or 33.94 miles of sewer line, using televising equipment on 51,082 feet to complete an interior inspection of the sewer line, and cleaned 337 different catch basins, valve basins and inlets in addition to other seasonal duties.

NILES POLICE DEPARTMENT Y2K (YEAR 2000) SCAMS

Scam artists are at it again. The year 2000, commonly known as Y2K, is fast approaching. Niles residents should beware of people calling representing credit card companies, banks or any other business and asking for important numbers – credit card, social security, bank account, so that their accounts can be “Y2K protected.” Do not give out these important numbers to anyone claiming to represent any of these companies. This information would not be obtained over the telephone. Most companies are solving their possible Y2K issues without individual customer’s information.

There are several different scams presently being used involving credit card numbers and bank account numbers. Protect your identity by not giving information to people that you do not know. If you have any questions regarding any of these scams, call the Niles Police Department for information at (847) 588-6500.

DO I NEED A PERMIT?

Summertime is an ideal time for home improvement projects. Residents may wonder if their project requires a permit from the Village. The answer is “yes” for all projects that go beyond typical decorating and painting.

The Village of Niles requires permits for projects to ensure that the job meets the requirements set forth in the Village Code. The Village of Niles has adopted and amended the BOCA (Building Officials and Code Administrators) National Code, which is a list of property maintenance and construction standards. These standards ensure proper construction and repair in order to maintain a very high quality and integrity of the structure.



By obtaining a permit, the Village can ensure that the contractor is licensed and bonded. By requiring all contractors be licensed and bonded (to \$25,000) the Village can ensure quality work and compliance with the Village Codes.

It is recommended that when doing any home improvement project, residents call the Village of Niles Code Enforcement Department (588-8000) to ensure that proper procedures are being followed.

NILES FIRE DEPARTMENT PARAMEDICS – USING CUTTING EDGE TECHNOLOGY


Niles Fire/Medics are cooperating with St. Francis Hospital to test new technology that will help diagnose heart attacks in minimal time. The new portable blood test kit being used by paramedics in the field can quickly indicate if a person is having a heart attack. The early detection of heart attacks is essential for immediate proper treatment at the hospital. Early detection of heart attacks can mean the difference between life and death.



The program is being conducted under the direction of Dr. Glen Aldinger, chairman of the St. Francis Hospital Department of Emergency Medicine and Director of the EMS Region overseen by the hospital. The test uses a few drops of blood to detect enzymes released by damaged heart muscle cells in the early stages of a heart attack.

NILES BRANCH PROGRAM PICKS UP

The Village of Niles free branch collection program is in full swing and right on schedule. Director of Public Services Teofilo Noriega explained the program, stating “Residents receive the free collection service once a month from April through September. This is a great



service to residents because there is no cost involved to them and they can count on us being there.” Noriega stressed that the program ends in September so crews

can change the equipment to begin the free leaf collection program. “Residents are reminded to make sure they have any branches they want picked up for the year out by their last pickup date in September,” said Noriega, adding that “we appreciate those people that follow the schedule because it assists us

keeping on schedule to provide other services.”

For residents living **EAST OF MILWAUKEE AVENUE**, pickup begins on the first Monday of each month and continues through that week. The pickup service for residents living **WEST OF MILWAUKEE AVENUE** begins on the last Monday of each month and continues through that week. Director Noriega stated, “Branches put out for collection must be less than 10 inches in diameter and tied in bundles no more than 18 inches in diameter and four (4) feet in length so that one person can lift the bundle. Stumps, roots or attached dirt will not be accepted.”

Highlighting the need for proper placement of the material, he emphasized the need for residents to place the branches on the parkway area – not the street. “If residents place branches in the street it could affect the drainage of storm water causing street flooding,” said Noriega. He added, “Our street sweepers need full access to the street to do their job right. If branches are left on the street the street can’t be cleaned.”

Last year Village crews made over 6,200 stops collecting almost 1,700 cubic yards of chipped branches.


