Testing will continue throughout the remainder of the year and a detailed contingency plan is in affect to handle any unforeseen issues at the beginning of the new year.

COMED WORKING TO IMPROVE ELECTRIC SERVICE IN NILES

ComEd has recognized that the Village of Niles has had problems with electric reliability during the past several years and has given Niles top priority towards improving reliability. Major commitments have been made to reinforce the electric system within the Village to prevent the problems that occurred during the summer of 1999.

ComEd has field inspected nineteen electric circuits and identified six problem areas served by fourteen of those circuits. Perhaps you may have noticed many ComEd crews working in Niles lately. We have been assured by ComEd that most of the work will be completed by December 31, 1999.



We will be meeting again with ComEd during the first quarter of 2000 to monitor progress made and determine if electric reliability has actually improved.

SALE OF VEHICLES

There have been many concerns regarding the sale of vehicles parked in front of residents' homes within the Village of Niles. Residents are reminded that according to the Niles Village Code, vehicles are not to be parked on the streets to display them for sale, *it is against the law!*



O'HARE AIRPORT NOISE HOTLINE

The Village of Niles is concerned with noise from aircraft flying in and out of O'Hare International Airport. The City of Chicago has set up a noise hotline to track resident complaints and concerns. The O'Hare Noise Abatement Hotline, 800/435-9569, fields calls for Low-Flying aircraft, Vibrations, Frequency of Operations and other concerns. Telephone call data is combined with information from the Airport Noise Monitoring System to identify aircraft and airlines that are creating noise events. Stickers with this telephone number are available at the Niles Administration Building, 1000 Civic Center Drive or by calling the Village at 588 - 8000.

Residents are encouraged to call the O'Hare Noise Abatement Hotline (800-435-9569). Let your voice be heard, call the Noise Abatement Hotline when you perceive a problem that persists over a period of time.

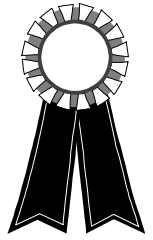

DELIGHT TO DISASTER IN 15 SECONDS - AVOID IT!

Holiday lights and Christmas tree safety practices are essential in all households. Trees can ignite immediately, and flames may reach the ceiling in 15 seconds. Please read the following safety tips presented by the Niles Fire Department.

- * Use an artificial tree carrying UL or other safety seals certifying it is slow burning or flame resistant.
- * If a natural tree is used, keep the stand filled with water. Also, minimize its stay in the home by buying late in December and discarding it as soon as possible after Christmas.
- * Try to find a freshly cut tree.
- * If lights are used, make sure they are approved by a testing lab. Check lights every year and dispose of frayed cords and broken bulbs.
- * Extension cords should be used sparingly.
- * Lights should be turned off at bedtime and when no one is home.

SNOW AND ICE CONTROL

While many people don't like it, leaves changing colors and falling to the ground can only mean one thing; snow will be falling before you know it. Believe it or not, the Public Services Department has been busy for months preparing for snow and ice control during the hot summer months.

Not long after the last snowflake fell this year, 4,000 tons of salt for the 1999/2000 winter season was ordered, plows were repaired, cleaned and repainted, and salt spreaders were serviced. Additionally, raised sewers that might damage plow equipment were lowered to preferred levels. Early preparation has helped the department respond to snow emergencies at a moment's notice with equipment ready to go.

Residents can also help us in our snow removal efforts by remembering a few simple items:

- ◆ Do not park your car on the street during snowstorms, on snow routes, and if possible, on side streets. Use a driveway if possible. This helps keep a clear path for the plow, allowing drivers to work faster and provide a clear street earlier.
- ◆ Do not shovel snow from your driveway onto the street. This can lead to accidents and will only require additional trips from the snowplow to clean the street. Plus, it is against the law.
- ◆ When driving, keep your distance from plow trucks. These vehicles are fully loaded and driving under adverse conditions. Stopping distances, due to the load of salt and slippery conditions, are increased. So increase your distance from the snow removal equipment as well. Also, salt is distributed from the rear of the vehicle, another reason to keep your distance.

Salt is used as the principal deicer because it is the most available and most cost-effective safe deicer. In the U.S. alone, some 10 million tons of deicing salt is used each year. The Village of Niles purchases 4,000 tons of salt per year and routinely treats salt with calcium chloride to increase its effectiveness in lower temperatures. As we did last year, the Village will also be purchasing salt treated with an anti-caking agent. This agent is non-toxic to animal and plant life, and can be identified as salt with a bluish tint.

Salt which does not cake spreads easier, does not damage equipment, and eliminates the need for personnel to remove blockages from equipment, such as salt spreading augers.

As soon as the snow falls, the Village stands ready with its snow fighting fleet and the best deicing products available.

ATTENTION HOMEOWNERS AND CONTRACTORS

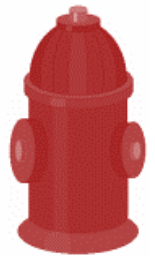


When shoveling sidewalks or driveways, do not push the snow into the public streets or alleys. Contractors must also follow this rule. In addition, do not bury fire hydrants with snow.

Shovel right — when shoveling your sidewalk or driveway, always pile the snow to your right when facing the street. The Village snowplows push the snow as they come down the street with the flow of traffic: snow piled to the LEFT of the sidewalk or driveway will be pushed back to where it has just been shoveled.

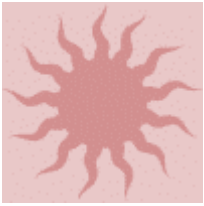
HOLIDAY STRESS



The holidays are upon us. For some people, even those who may appear to be happy during the season, the holidays may be a time of anxiety, stress, depression and loneliness. Consequently, some individuals become less productive, while others take on second jobs just to pay the extra holiday bills. This season can be especially difficult for people who have lost a loved one or close friend, or if the loss occurred during the previous holiday season. Sometimes, an individual thinks they are under stress when they are actually struggling with another type of disorder (depression, anxiety, substance abuse in the family, etc.) To see if you are at risk for holiday stress or holiday blues, answer the following questions:

- * Are you anxious about or dreading the upcoming holidays?
- * Do you seem to usually run out of time to do things every holiday season?
- * Are the holidays unusually painful for you every year due to the loss of a loved one or memories of difficult past holidays?
- * Do family holiday parties seem chaotic? Do family members get along?
- * Do your needs tend to be pushed aside? Do your needs always have to come first?
- * Are your holidays a lonely or painful experience?
- * Are your perceptions and expectations of the holidays realistic?
- * Are finances a problem every year?

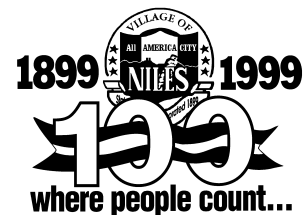

COLD ALERT POLICY



The Village of Niles has established a Cold Alert Emergency Plan, which will go into effect when the combination of wind and temperature reached 35 degrees below zero, or when there are three consecutive days where the temperature is below 10 degrees. When the Village Manager calls a Cold Alert, all departments of the Village will be on standby to assist residents in need. Reverse 911 will be used to notify elderly residents of the plan and where to call for information. The Cold Alert plan is for emergency weather situations, during non-working hours such as evenings or weekends. In an emergency, residents are encouraged to call 911 for assistance. When it is deemed necessary, the Family Fitness Center and Human Services Building will be open as warming centers.

The Village Code for rental units states that daytime temperatures should be kept at 65 degrees and overnight temperatures at 60 degrees. If the heat is not working, the tenant should call the property manager/owner. If the property owner/manager is not available within a reasonable time and you need assistance, call Code Enforcement during business hours at (847) 588 - 8000 of the Niles Police Department after business hours at (847) 588 - 6500. In an emergency, dial 911.



IF you have family, friends, or neighbors who are elderly or disabled, please check on them. IF you would like to have them called by Reverse 911 during a Cold Alert, please contact the Human Services Department at (847) 588 - 8420 between the hours of 8:30 A.M. and 5:00 P.M., Monday through Friday.

CHRISTMAS TREE DISPOSAL AND GARBAGE SERVICE



Christmas trees and live wreaths can be disposed of for all Village residents. Trees should be free of any decorations, such as tinsel and ornaments, and should be placed on the parkway on the same day as garbage collection.

High-gloss wrapping paper must be discarded; however, general wrapping paper may be recycled.

INCOME TAX PROGRAM FOR SENIORS

WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS

❄ Residents are advised to use their garages and driveways since parked vehicles during snowstorms cause the greatest hardship for the snow removal operations.

❄ Residents living on a designated snow route are reminded that parking is prohibited on either side of the street after a one-inch snowfall, and until snow removal operations have been completed.



Because of the nature of the Village, certain areas in town do not have driveways; therefore, residents must park on the street. These "exempt" streets are obviously not affected by the snow parking regulations; however, residents NOT living on a designated snow route or exempt street must comply with the following: after a 3-inch snowfall, no parking is allowed on the odd numbered side of the street for 24 hours after the snow stops, or until the street is plowed. The same applies for the even numbered side of the street during the next 24-hour period.

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

- * Buckle your seat belt!
- * When your windshield wipers are on, turn on your headlights - it's the law!
- * Keep your windshield clear of snow and ice.
- * Drive slower and increase your following distance.
- * When you approach a snow plow from behind, pass with care and only when you can see the road ahead of the plow.
- * Check your wipers, tires, lights, and fluid levels regularly. Make sure the brakes and transmission are working properly.
- * During a winter storm ask yourself, "is this trip really necessary?" Always check on weather driving conditions.
- * Tell someone (friend, relative, or co-worker) that you are taking a trip, where you are going and when you expect to arrive.
- * Always have you gas tank at least half-full.



Keep the following items in your vehicle in case of an emergency:

- ✓ First aid kit
- ✓ Blankets and extra clothing
- ✓ Jumper cables, shovel, salt, and windshield wiper fluid
- ✓ Flashlight with extra batteries

GOLF MILL SHOPPING CENTER 1999 CASH BACK FOR SCHOOLS PROGRAM

Golf Mill Shopping Center has launched its 1999 Cash Back for Schools Program during a ribbon cutting ceremony by Mayor Nicholas Blase, symbolizing the start of the holiday shopping season.
